


What's Your **Dream?**

Did You Know?

Did you know that before your unit takes on a money-earning project that the unit must complete a BSA money earning application and have it approved by the local council. This checklist can serve as your guide. It will be helpful to you as you fill out the Unit Money-Earning application. If your answer is yes to all the questions that follow, it is likely that the project conforms with Scouting's standards and will be approved.

10 GUIDES TO UNIT MONEY-EARNING

1. Have your unit committee and chartered organization approved your project, including the dates and methods? There should be a real need for raising money based on your unit's program. We should not engage in special money-earning projects merely because someone has offered us an attractive plan. It's important to remember that individual youth members are also expected to earn their own way. The need should be over and above normal budget items covered by dues.

2. Do yourplan and corresponding dates avoid competition with money-raising efforts and policies of otherunits, your chartered organization, your local council, and United Way? Check with your chartered organization representative to make certain that your chartered organization agrees on the dates and type of fund-raiser. The chartered organization representative can also clear the other dates by calling the council service center.

3. Does your plan comply with local ordinances; is it free from any association with gambling; and is it consistent with the ideals and purposes of the Boy Scouts of America? Money-raising projects that include the sale of raffle tickets are in violation of this policy. This question can be answered only in terms of specific proposals. If there is any question of its suitability, contact your local council service center for assistance.

4. If a commercial product is to be sold, will it be sold on its own merits and without reference to the needs of Scouting, either directly (during sales presentations) or indirectly? Teaching youth members to become self-reliant and to earn their own way is an important part of training our youth members. The official uniform is intended to be worn primarily for use in connection with Scouting activities. However, the uniform may be worn in connection with council-sponsored product sales programs (Trails End Popcorn).

Top 5 Tips for a Successful Sale

Follow these five steps for a Successful Popcorn Sale!

- 1. Establish an annual Plan and Budget with input from your Scouts and Parents.
- 2. Set a Unit Popcorn Sale Goal, and break that goal down to a Per Scout Goal based on the plan and budget.
- 3. Conduct a Unit Popcorn Kickoff to communicate the Program and Per Scout Popcorn Sale Goal to the Scout Families.

4. Sell in the neighborhoods using the following methods:

- Take Order
- Show & Deliver
- Utilize "Blitz Days" throughout the sale
- Practice role-playing with the boys on the proper selling techniques, and the script to be used at the door.
- 5. Have prizes/incentives on hand for the Scouts to earn.

5. If tickets are sold for any function other than a Scouting event, will they be sold by your youth members as individuals without depending on the goodwill of Scouting to make this sale possible? Tickets may be sold by youth members in uniform in the name of Scouting for such things as pack shows, troop suppers, circuses, expositions, and similar Scouting events.

6. Even when sales are confined to parents and friends, will they get their money's worth from any product they purchase, function they attend, or services they receive from your unit? Here again is the principle of value received—a sale standing on its own merit-so that the recipients are not in any way subsidizing either Scouting or the member. Youth members must learn to pay their own way and to honestly earn the money to do it. You cannot permit anyone to use the good name of Scouting to sell a product.

7. If a project is planned for a particular area, do you respect the right of other Scouting units in the same neigh**borhood?** It's a courtesy to check with neighboring units or the local council service center to coordinate the time of your project and to see that you aren't covering their territory Your unit commissioner can help you with this.

8. Is it reasonably certain that people who need work or business will not lose it as a result of your unit's plan? Your unit should neither sell nor offer services that will damage someone's livelihood. If possible, check with the people who may be affected.

9. Will your plan protect the name and goodwill of the Boy Scouts of America and prevent it from being capitalized on by promoters of shows, benefits, or sales campaigns? Because of Scouting's good reputation, customers rarely question the quality or price of a product. Unchecked, the network of Scouting units could become a beehive of commercial interest to the neglect of character building and citizenship training.

10. If any contracts are to be signed by yourunit, will they be signed by an individual without reference to the Boy Scouts of America, and in no way appear to bind the local council, the Boy Scouts of America, orthe chartered organization to any agreement of financial responsibility? Before anyone in your unit signs a contract, he must make sure the venture is legitimate and worthy. If a contract is signed, he is personally responsible. He cannot sign on behalf of the local council or the Boy Scouts of America, nor may he bind the chartered organization without its written authorization . If you're not sure, check with your local council service center for help.

Every Unit Needs a News Reporter

Everyone in our community should know what your unit is doing and the great education our youth are obtaining through Scouting. If your unit has a News Reporter they can prepare News Releases for your local news papers and for Scouting News. The Council Website (www.rtcbsa.org) has a complete list of local news papers and their contacts for News Releases.

News Releases are easy to write up and many newspapers and TV stations now have e-mail addresses that you can send them to. Don't forget to send releases to your Chartering Organization, local church, educational, community or corporate newsletters!

Every News Release should be written to answer the essential questions of any news item, commonly called the 5 Ws plus 1:

- Who will do it? • What will they do?
- When will they do it? • Where will they do it?
- Why will they do it? • How will they do it?

The structure of the News Release is important. It must be written so that the reader has the essential information at the outset. The lead, usually the first paragraph or two, should summarize the "5 Ws plus 1" to give the reader an overview. The rest of the paragraphs will answer the six questions. The longer the News Release, the better. The News Release should be typed double-spaced. The top of the page should include a title, contact name, and telephone number. ALWAYS include the Council Website address (www.rtcbsa.org), from there people can find out more about what we do and how to join. If your unit has a Website, include it in the article. Note that if a paper prints your news release as written and needs to trim off for space, they will trim from the bottom.

News Releases should be sent out for all sorts of activities, including, but not limited to:

- Special trips · Parent's Nights
- · Social Activities • Special events
- · Election of Officers · Service Projects
- · Pinewood Derbies • Spring and Fall Recruiting
- Court of Honors
 - Unusual events at camp

Photos catch the eye of the reader and make a story more interesting. News reporters know this and want a photo in the story as much as you do. If you have a photo, send it to them, but many newspapers would prefer to shoot their own. That means giving them plenty of notice of when your event will take place.

ly how they wish to be notified about your event. Some request snail mail (not too many now) some will provide a special fax number, others may have a hotline, and still others may offer e-mail. They may also request a certain format. Ask about any special issues. They may have a neighborhood section that comes out a specific day of the week, their may be an annual issue with community groups. Ask about deadlines they may have for those issues.

5. Keep holidays in mind. It's a cliché, but helping the needy at Christmas, helping with a 4th of July event, etc. is classic Scouting and a standard for many papers.

6. Submit, submit, submit. They will not yell at you for overloading their mailbox. They receive dozens to hundreds of these each day/week. The best ones or ones that catch the editor's attention get published.

7. It may help if you can make friends with the editor.

8. For pictures, action shots are generally better than lineups but in any case be sure the people in the picture are identifiable. Think about a sports picture and how it usually focuses on one or two people--the other six or twenty people who were around the action got cut out by the photo editor. The focus is now on the action and the attention grabber isn't lost in a crowd of people. It helps to provide larger pictures, i.e., 8x10, when available. Providing negatives helps with some papers.

9. Sometimes all that will be published is the picture with a caption. Clearly identify everyone in the picture and you may wish to secure releases from the parents of the kids. Some parent may not want a child's picture in the paper.

10. Think of how your event is unusual, i.e., the man bites dog story rather than the dog bites man. Special awards, big numbers, etc. should start your story. Avoid beginning "At Troop's monthly court of honor . . "What is different about your court of honor or event. One unit got some great coverage for their Court of Honor (COH) when the bat lady was the program --"Bat Lady Gives Life to Two Scouts". A professor who studies bats showed some slides at the COH in anticipation on an upcoming outing to a bat cave. They had her present the Life Scout badges to two boys. Meanwhile, the story included all the other recognitions that evening. Another local troop sent in their list of awards from a COH the same night and got no story.

Some Tips:

1. Local weekly and semi-weekly newspapers are much more likely to publish your story. Look on the Editorial pages of those newspapers for a list of phone numbers and e-mail addresses.

2. Watch, listen, read your local media and start a list of media outlets that reports on these types of local events.

3. Read the paper and get a feel for the writing style. Write a news story not an advertisement. Your article may be cut so put the most important items up front.

4. Write to each media company and ask for their Guidelines for Submissions. This should outline exact-

11. News comes from NEW, not old. Get your stories in right away. If you take a week getting the info to the media, it is less likely to be used--history doesn't sell many newspapers.

12. If your story doesn't get into the paper, don't give up. Keep at it, you may have just hit a big news day and there wasn't room. If several stories don't make it, give the editor a call and find out what you could do to improve your chances of getting published.

Finally, don't forget to thank the reporter after the article is published for doing a good job in reporting the event! Also, if you include a picture YOU MUST HAVE A "TALENT RELEASE FROM". Contact the Scout Service Center for a copy of the form. Here are three examples of news releases that a unit might use:

Troop 4 in New Hartford turns 40

New Hartford Troop 4 was established in 1967. Over the last 40 years Troop 4 has had one of the largest and most active troops in the district. Troop 4 goes on campouts, does volunteer work, and goes on an annual "Spring Trip."

To date, 56 young men have reached the rank of Eagle Scout in Troop 4. This ties the record for the most Eagle Scouts in the district that was set by Troop 88. Troop 88 is no longer in existence.

56 Eagle Scouts means 56 Eagle Scout projects completed by the troop. Recent projects included the Memorial to Joseph Corr at Myles Elementary, landscaping at the Utica Public Library, work on trails at the Washington Mills Park, and picnic tables built for the Utica Zoo.

Troop 4 has taken part in hundreds of other volunteer projects including Scouting for Food, serving for the Rotary Club of New Hartford Annual pancake breakfast, and handing out water at the at the finish line of the Boilermaker Walk. In the past year, the troop planted trees along Route 28, took part in the dedication of the New Hartford Veterans Memorial, and helped with a project at Cedarlands.

Every summer Troop 4 goes to summer camp for a week. In recent years the troop has gone to Cedarlands Scout Reservation near Long Lake, New York. Every fall Troop 4 attends The International Brotherhood Camporee. Other annual campouts include the District Fall and Spring Camporee, the Klondike Derby, and the Father-son Camp Weekend. Troop 4 Scouts have participated in GAWASA and Junior Leadership Training.

The annual "Spring Trip" is a fun and educational trip to places in driving distance. Recent "Spring Trip" destinations included Buffalo, Niagara Falls, Scranton, Lake Placid, Toronto, Mystic Seaport in Connecticut, Ottawa, Washington DC, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New York City. We visited historical places like Gettysburg, Liberty Hall, the USS Intrepid, The Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, Annapolis Naval Academy, The Coast Guard Academy, and the submarine Base at Groton, Connecticut.

- Gun Safety Training and Range Shooting Training by certified instructors
- Boys 12 and over used 22 caliber rifles, 11 year old used air rifles.
- The biathlon consisted of a snowshoe course with 6 supervised shooting stations
- Scoring was done by a combination of shooting results and speed through the course.
- A winter shelter campout

The Promotional Ideas is a list of things you can do to inform your target market. Keep in mind that the best way to market your product, Scouting, is by word of mouth by those who are having "fun" in the program. Scouts and Scouters are our best spokesmen and sales force.

Now you may be saying, "This is great stuff, but who will help me pull this all together?" Well, you are not out there all alone. There is a committee in place to assist you with any questions you may have. First the council has a Vice-President of Membership, Dave Manore. Under the Membership head-

ing there is a Council Cub Scout Roundup Chairperson, Ms. Audrey Wheelock. Each District will have a District Roundup Chairperson and each individual Pack should have a Pack Roundup Chairperson.

Additional Cub Scout Promotion Ideas

The following is a list of promotion ideas that can help you be more effective in getting your message to the boys and families in your community. Be sure to include in all your promotional materials an invitation to your roundup event, including date, time, place, and a brief but exciting description of pack activities. Also include the telephone number of a pack leader who can be contacted for more information. Contact your local council for complete details and assistance in selecting the marketing tools that will have the most effective impact in your neighborhood.

• Make lists or cards with the first names and phone numbers of boys in the area. Have pack leaders call the night before the rally to ask parents if they got the invitations and remind them of the meeting.

• Place yard signs in strategically good locations: at high traffic areas, bus stops, and lawns of current members. (Be sure you don't violate city ordinances about signs.)

• Post flyers and posters on bulletin boards throughout your area in key locations (schools, religious institutions, community recreation centers, day care centers, grocery stores, malls, public libraries, pediatrician centers, etc.).

• Tray liners and placemats may be used in a variety of venues, such as fast-food restaurants, direct mail, and grocery stores (as grocery bag stuffers).

• Half-sheet bulletin inserts are great tools for delivering recruiting information through chartered organization mailings, church bulletins, community recreation centers, and as sporting event announcements.

• Door hangers and postcards aid in direct home delivery of a specific invitation to join.

• Public service announcements, newspapers, radio, TV, billboards, and direct mail are also ways to communicate your invitation to join.

• Use a movie theater PSA extending your invitation to join in local movie houses.

• Ask schools to put joining information in student electronic mailboxes. Automated messages can be programmed for boys in each grade.

• Grocery stores might print your message on their grocery bags, if arranged for early enough.

• Get local advertisers to include your message in their "drop-in flyers."

• Use marquees to invite boys and their families to join.

• Promote the round-up night with all chartered organizations in your community (religious institutions, schools, service clubs, youth organizations, etc.).

• Set up a sample campsite outside in view of a high-traffic area for boys and parents to show them that Cub Scouts go camping. (Good locations include malls, superstores, schools, religious institutions, child-development/day care centers, parks and recreation centers, and community centers.

• Set up a pinewood derby track at a high-traffic area for boys and parents (see list above for suggested sites).

Camp Russell Survival Week 2007

Camp Russell Survival Week 2007 to be held August 5-11 is a provisional week designed to attract Scouts and Scout leaders who are interested in learning primitive camping and wilderness survival skills. Skills taught in this course would include, but are not limited to: improvised first aid, field craft, shelter building, edible plant identification, improvised compass and navigational skills, primitive fire building, and rescue signaling techniques. Advancement Questions & Issues

Insignias, Uniforms and Badges

"The Boy Scouts of America has always been a uniformed body. Its uniforms help to create a sense of belonging. They symbolize character development, citizenship training. and personal fitness. Wearing a uniform gives youth and adult members a sense of identification and commitment."

A uniform gives the wearer an opportunity to show the activity, responsibility and achievements he/she has been able to accomplish through advancement and program opportunities. Recognition is given by the insignia worn on the uniform. Each unit should have uniform inspections at least once a year to assist the youth and adult members in correctly wearing their uniform and insignias.

The following addresses some of the most common errors or questions in regards to uniforms or insignias. Merit Badge sashes are worn from the right shoulder to the left hip. The sash should never be worn on the belt.

The OA honor sash is worn on the right shoulder under the epaulet of the tan shirt to the left waist. The sash is never worn on the belt.

An OA sash and a merit badge sash should never be worn together.

Temporary patches should be worn centered on the right pocket. Only one temporary patch may be worn at a time. (The World Conservation Award is a temporary patch).

Trained Leaders Emblem should be worn only in connection with the emblem of office for which training has been completed. Boy Scout junior leaders who have completed troop junior leader training and Den Chiefs who have completed the den chief training conference may wear this emblem. The **emblem of office** should be the current position held. If you are holding more than one position, only wear one of the emblem.

Quality Unit Achievement may be worn by both youth and adults. Only wear the most current year earned.

World Crest may be worn by all members of Scouting to symbolize their membership in the World Scouting movement.

Miniature **metal rank pins** are for civilian wear and for parents.

With the exception of Cub Scouts, only the most **current rank badge** should be worn.

Everyone should be very proud to wear their uniform. Let's keep it uncluttered and neat. Wear your insignias correctly. Any questions in regard to uniforms or insignias may be directed to the Council Advancement Committee and we will address them in future columns.

YEAR ROUND MERIT BADGE OPPORTUNITIES

Scouting offers exceptional opportunities to learn about our eco-system and how we are an integral part of our environment. Take time to review some of the numerous merit badges that you can earn during the entire year within our region. Camping, Hiking, Skiing, Swimming, Canoeing, Nature, Fishing, Soil & Water Conservation, Environmental Science, Botany, Weather, Animal Science, Fish & Wildlife Management, Gardening, Insect Study, Mammal Study and Wilderness Survival are just a few of the great learning opportunities you can encounter through the Merit Badge program. In addition, take a look at some of the career oriented merit badges: Medicine, Crime Prevention, Law, Dentistry, Engineering, Electricity, Plumbing and Geology. If you are interested in specific merit badge, contact your Scoutmaster and Troop Advancement Chairperson without delay so that he/she may recommend an approved merit badge counselor!

Additional persons are appointed by the Council Advancement Chairman to serve as Members-At-Large on the Committee.

FROM THE REGISTRAR'S DESK

EAGLE SCOUT APPLICATION PROCESS

It is very important that as our Scouts progress on the Trail to Eagle that we also make sure that they are taught the correct procedure to secure their Eagle application, references and final paperwork. One way is that it is highly recommended is for Life Scouts along with their parents, Scoutmaster, Assistant Scoutmaster and Unit Advancement Chairman attend the Life to Eagle seminars that held in all four Districts of our Council. Please call to see when the next seminar is scheduled.

The Eagle application has to be a Verified one that only the Council Registrar can give to you. Scoutmasters, Assistant Scoutmaster, Unit Advancement Chairman, parents and Eagle Candidates when you call to make sure that everything is in order PLEASE make sure that when I send you your Verified Eagle application that you secure the correct signatures and return it to me with the whole completed workbook.

The Eagle Reference Letter process is explained below; please read the following very carefully and follow the instructions.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR EAGLE CANDIDATE LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Step 1. Personally contact all six individuals whom you wish to include as references on your Eagle application. Call, e-mail or write to these persons yourself. Do not allow your parents, relatives, unit leaders or any one else to handle this important responsibility. Explain your status as an Eagle candidate and specifically request that they serve as a reference for you. Ask if they would be willing to fill out the recommendation forms. Inform them of any deadlines that are approaching if applicable. (Date of scheduled BOR's or 18th birthday)

Step 2. Fill in your name on each of the specific evaluation forms. If you are employed (paid or volunteer) give one to your employer and one to another reference of your choice.

Step 3. Prepare envelopes that are addressed to your District Advancement Chairman(see below). Make sure you place a stamp on this envelope and that YOUR NAME is placed on the envelope near the bottom. This will ensure that the Chairman knows whose letter it is. The envelope will allow the person writing the recommendation to send the letters confidentially.

Step 4. Hand deliver or mail the recommendation forms and stamped, addressed envelope to the person writing the recommendation.

PROCEDURES FOR OBTAINING AND COMPLETING EAGLE SCOUTAPPLICA-TIONS

Effective March 31, 2003, the Eagle Scout application became an electronic form generated by the Council Registrar. When produced, this electronic form becomes your official Verified Eagle Scout application and will be submitted electronically to National Boy Scouts of America for approval upon completion of your Board of Review.

Only the Verified application will be submitted to your District Advancement Committee for holding your Board of Review.

REOUESTING THE EAGLE SCOUT APPLICA-TION

Please note the following directions for requesting and completing your application:

Step 1: Once you have earned all required merit badges and rank badges for Eagle, you or someone you designate should request a Person Profile Report (your detailed advancement history report) from the council to validate that the council records and your unit's records agree. If there are any date discrepancies involving the advancement, consult with your Scoutmaster and/or Advancement Committee Chairman to resolve them. Once resolved, be sure to send in any copies of advancement paperwork or blue cards to the council to reconcile the records between the troop and council.

Step 2: After all advancement records have been verified and validated by your unit leader and your Eagle Scout project has been completed, you or your unit leader can request the Council Registrar to generate your Eagle Scout application by supplying your complete legal name which includes first, middle and last name, telephone number and troop number. Please make these phoning, e-mailing requests by

- Verify all Cub Scout information and grade completed prior to joining Boy Scouts
- Verify your Boy Scout, First Class and Star rank dates
- Verify Life Scout date
- You must write in your reference names. You will need to provide complete names, addresses (including P.O. Box numbers) and telephone numbers for all personal references.
- Verify advancement information for merit badges or rank badges.
- Positions of responsibility held for 6 or more months after turning Life Scout.
- Verify board of review date that you earned Life Scout
- Date your project was completed
- Requirement #6 is very important and is overlooked by both the Unit leader and Scout: Write a statement of your ambitions and life purpose and a listing of positions held in your religious institution, school, camp and community or other organization that demonstrated leadership skills. Include honors and awards received during this time period.
- Take part in a Scoutmaster conference
- Under Certification by applicant: You will have to sign the Verified application, list your current telephone number and date attesting everything on the Verified Eagle Scout application has been done before your 18th birthday.
- Under Unit approval: You need to give this form to your unit leader. The Scoutmaster and the Unit Committee Chairman will review the Verified Eagle Scout application and your Eagle Scout project and sign approving your nomination to Eagle Scout.

FINALIZING & PRESENTING THE PROJECT:

When submitting your Verified Eagle Scout application and project, please make sure that you have enclosed requirement #6 and any other attachments as well as the before and after pictures in a notebook or binder so that this important information is contained and the project is presentable.

Advancement Reminders

Step 5. Do this for each of the SIX references required.

Step 6. As the Board of Review approaches, make sure that the District Advancement Chairman has received all your letters and have put them with your completed Eagle workbook. You are permitted to follow up with the individuals, but should coordinate any additional communications with the BOR chairman to ensure all correspondence has been received.

Step 7. Write the names, addresses and phone numbers for your references on the front of your Eagle application.

Step 3: Please allow 1 business day for the Council Registrar to process your request for an electronic Eagle Scout application. Your electronic Eagle Scout application will be mailed to you unless you indicate otherwise.

You must make sure of the following:

- You will need to give your complete legal name (including full middle name). National Eagle Scout Services will reject your Eagle Scout application if the full legal name (including full middle name) is not listed.
- Verify your home address, telephone number, troop number
- Verify your date of birth

- We have been sent applications for applying for The Sons of the American Revolution scholarship award. You may pick them up at the Council office: 1401 Genesee Street, Utica, NY. You do not have to be this years Eagles to apply and you can continue to apply until you reach your 19th birthday. Their only stipulation is that you are currently registered with a unit.
- · District and Council membership expires June 30th at midnight, please remember to send your \$10.00 in early to the attention of the Council Registrar.
- Unit leaders, please notify the Council Registrar if you have a handicapped youth in your unit with a valid IEP. Special arrangements can be made to modified ranks or merit badge advancements.


Frankfort Troop News


Diamond District News
